Football 1962-63

CHS 21 Peoria Woodruff 19

Coach Tom Stewart's gridders started the 1962 football season by continuing their devastating ground attack in rolling their fourth victory in a row. Transfer student Tink Vaughn provided the initial excitement as he blasted 57 yards on the first offensive play of the year. Vaughn also recorded another score on a 23 yard pass. John Eppler gained 118 yards including a three yard plunge to paydirt. The actual margin of victory was determined by the defense, as the whole left side of the line converged on Peoria's quarterback in the end zone for a safety.


CHS 54 Springfield Lanphier 0

With the first unit playing less than onehalf of the game, the Maroons steamrolled for a fantastic 422 yards rushing. Mike Carrington led the attack, gaining 130 yards including a 32 yard touchdown run. Carrington also returned a punt 72 yards for another score. Fullback John Eppler blasted for two touchdowns, and his understudy, junior Jim Zindars, gained another. Alternating quarterbacks, John Mulliken recorded two scores via air routes, completing a three yarder to Jim Heimburger and an eleven yard aerial to senior Don Slater. The other alternating quarterback, Bill Hay, added six extra points.

CHS 26 Mattoon 7

Senior halfback Tink Vaughn gained 92 yards and had touchdown spurts of four and three yards before being sidelined because of a pulled muscle. Jim Heimburger stepped in where Vaughn left off as he caught touchdown passes of 14 and 49 yards from Bill Hay, who added two extra points. The Maroon's offense remained potent, as it again picked up over 300 total yards. Quarterback Joe Spurgeon provided Mattoon's only score.



The Big Games

CHS 41 Danville Schlarman 0

Mike Carrington scored two more touch-downs and the CHS defense got a little stingy in recording win number four for the Maroons. Carrington's scores came on a 16 yard run and a 54 yard punt return. John Eppler and Tink Vaughn, twin tanks, each scored on one yard plunges. Junior halfback John Ingleman also got into the act by spimning for a ten yard score. Bill Hay's five extra points and his 26 yard touchdown pass to Mike Womacks ended the game. The CHS defense limited Schlarman to a meager seven yards rushing.

CHS 27 Springfield 0

Though a victory, the Springfield game proved very detrimental to the Maroons, as they lost the services of halfback Tink Vanghn through a knee injury. This did not, however stop the Maroons from rushing for 369 yards including two long jaunts. John Eppler lead the attack with 174 yards, scoring touchdowns of 2 and 67 yards. Mike Carrington then got off the longest score of the season, an 86 yard run in which he outran everyone but Eppler. Carrington ended with 155 yards for the night. Jim Heimburger added 16 yards of fancy running for a tally in the third shutout of the season.

CHS 33 Lincoln 7

The Maroons moved on to roll up their ninth straight in two seasons by spoiling Lincoln's

homecoming and holding the Railers to 41 yards total offense. Touchdowns were scored by John Eppler and Bill Hay, each with one yard plunges, Mike Carrington, on runs of 20 and 19 yards, and Jim Heimburger, on a 17 yard run. For the first time this season, the Maroon's offensive attack failed to provide a score on the first set of downs, but it went on to gain 326 yards.

CHS 13 Galesburg 13

Galesburg quarterback Robbin Watters singlehandedly threw the Maroon machine out of kilter as he gained 133 yards and both scores. Mike Carrington offset these tallies with touchdown spurts of two and five yards. Bill Bales spoiled the Streak's bid to accomplish a win over us as he blocked an extra point attempt following their game—tieing scores.

CHS 32 Danville 32

Danville's Vikings pulled out a bag of tricks that were just good enough to keep the Maroons guessing too long to gain a victory. John Eppler led the Champaign attack, scoring three touchdowns. Eppler got two of his scores on four yard blasts up the middle and a 44 yard romp over all eleven Danville players. Mike Carrington had another good night as he scored the first time he got the


ball. Danville kicked off and John Ingleman handed off to Carrington who raced 87 yards down the sidelines for the score. His other touchdown came on a 57 yard end sweep.

CHS 0 Urbana 20

Urbana's Tigers completely outplayed the Maroon's in handing the gridders their first loss of the campaign and first shut-out in twenty five games. It was a sad story as the Maroons could muster only 61 total offensive yards while yielding a season high of 280 total yards. The CHS team seemed to lack their usual offensive punch as they found the Tiger line impenetrable. The defensive yield represented one fourth of the season's yield. The Maroons, thoroughly disappointed, are now looking forward to next year and another chance.

Basketball 1962-63

The 1962-1963 basketball season not only provided a winning record and regional championship, it also gave Coach Lee Cabutti two coaching milestones; 200 career victories and 100 wins as CHS head basketball coach. The Maroons were fifteen and eleven for the season, winning eleven of their last fifteen. This success in the latter portion of the season was largely due to a change in offense that saw the Cagers slow the game considerably, passing and cutting until the defense eased up, providing a high percentage shot.

Cabutti recorded win number 100 at the CHS helm at Rantoul in the first game of the season, winning 45-42. Don Langhoff was high point man with 16. The Maroons chalked up their first Big Twelve win by defeating Springfield, 46-41, in the Springfield Armory.

Langhoff again paced the cagers with 17 points. State-rated Quincy then invaded the Champaign gym and narrowly escaped defeat, winning 42-38. High point man for Champaign was F. M. Walker with 14 points.

The team recorded their second league win against the Lincoln Railsplitters, 53-44. This was the eleventh in twelve games played with Lincoln. Walker again paced the Maroon scoring as he dumped in 18 points. Danville then handed the Maroons their first conference loss, 54-53, as the cagers missed their final shot after losing a ten-point lead.

Coach Cabutti received an early Christmas present in the form of a 51-49 upset over defeating state champion, Decatur. Don Langhoff and F. M. Walker led the scoring with 16 points each, as the Maroons fought back from a 17 point deficit in the third quarter. This tremendous upset did not, however, inspire the Cagers during the Centralia Holiday Tourney, as they dropped two, one to Pickneyville by a score of 44-26, and another to Rockford Auburn, 66-44, who was destined to become an eventual member of the elite eight. Jim Terry led the scoring, dropping through 24 in two games as the Maroons shot less than 200.

The Maroons dropped their fourth to the Bloomington Raiders, 34-19. They slowed the game down, and at the end of three quarters, the score was tied at 17 all. In the fourth quarter, Bloomington exploded for 17 points while the Maroons could add only two. CHS shot a frigid .162 from the field, while again a poor fourth quarter prevented the Cagers from victory against the Mattoon Green Wave, CHS losing 52-46.




Chuck Spencer tries to hold the ball away from the Springfield Senators.



C.H.S. Cagers

Urbana collected their fourth straight victory over CHS, 55-51, as Don Michael ranked top point man for Champaign, adding 19 points. The Maroon's main trouble was fouls, which was shown when Champaign was called for 26 errors, and Urbana was whistled for only 7.

During this five game losing streak, Coach Cabutti decided to slow down the offense to a very deliberate style, which was immediately named "stall ball." The purpose was not to bore the opposition, but to control the ball, score, and win the game by wearing down the opponent and creating a hole for a close shot. The new offense brought a marked increase in both shooting and free throwing. At the time of this change, the CHS Cagers were three and four in Big Twelve play, while four and seven in nonconference action.

The first test of the new offense was Lincoln, and it worked perfectly as the Maroons ran away with the game 61-30, shooting a sizzling .688. The methodical pass and cut gave high scorers F. M. Walker and Don Langhoff many layups as they recorded 25 and 17, respectively. The Maroons showed that Lincoln wasn't lucky by bombing Pontiac in the Rantoul Invitational, 57-27. Walker again led scorers with 18. In the championship game, the Maroons looked tired as they dropped number nine, 46-36, with Jim Terry collecting 13, to an excellent Kankake team.

Back in their own gym, the Maroons made it four for five with the new offense as they took a 39-34 win from Danville, marking Cabutti's 200th career victory, and a 29-25 decision from Decatur MacArthur. F. M. Walker was high point man in each case with 15 and 19 points respectively.

Cabutti's chargers then played Stephen Decatur and commanded play for the entire first half. But the Reds showed the stuff that Champs are made of as they capitalized on every CHS miscue in the final half, to win 50-45. F. M. Walker paced CHS with sixteen points.

After a meager first quarter and better second quarter, the Maroons displayed a magnificent combination of defense, offense, and rebounding in out playing Urbana, 37-32. F. M. Walker led the attack with 14 points as Jim Booth was held to six. The Pontiac game on the following day was fairly anticlimactic as Pontiac won the game at the charity stripe, 59-40.

Regional Winners


In a make-or-break game at Mattoon, the Maroons came through with a 31 for 36 effort on free throws to beat the Green Wave 47-35. Against Bloomington, the cagers were again outscored from the field but won the game at the free throw line, 42-37. In this crucial series that gave the Maroons undisputed possession of second place, Don Langhoff, Jim Terry and F. M. Walker led scorers with 25, 23, and 21 points respectively. The Maroons finished out the conference campaign by repeating a 46-41 victory against Springfield with high jumping Walker scoring 20 points.

Champaign took a twelve and ten record into their own Regional and crushed Bell-flower, 59-33. In the semi-finals, the Maroons took on top seeded Mahomet-Seymour and pulled a 34-32 upset, as Walker was high with

12. In the Championship game, it was Don Langhoff all the way, as the lanky senior dumped in 20 points and played his best game in the Maroon's 60-47 victory.

As Regional Champs, Cabutti's Cagers advanced to the sectional at Urbana to meet Rantoul. The Maroons had ignition trouble and found themselves down by ten points at the intermission. They fought back however, and took a 51-50 lead with 35 seconds left in the game, but Rantoul's center threw in a fifteen footer. The Maroons couldn't get the ball in for a close shot, and John Mulliken rimmed a twenty footer, as Rantoul gained the victory, 52-51. This ended part two of the season bringing their season's total to a creditable fifteen wins and eleven losses.






Urbana's Jim Booth stands by helplessly as Jim Terry makes a basket for CHS.


Coach Harold Jester's harriers enjoyed another fine season, winning seven of nine dual meets, losing only to conference and District champions, Urbana.

Captain Jim Terry and three returning lettermen, Bob Randolph, Ron Pellum, and Jim Cassells, were the nucleus, and usually all four finished in the top five places.


At the Peoria Invitational, a meet larger than the State, the harriers finished sixth, as did Captain Terry individually. Copping first place, Jim led the Maroons to a second place finish in the Big 12, while both Jim and the team dropped one position in the District, and finished sixteenth in State competition.



Track 1962

A second straight conference crown was won by coach Harold Jester's 1962 trackmen as they posted an almost perfect 5-0-1 season record. The Maroons added a second in the district meet, but, although CHS was represented by eight men in eight events, were unable to place in the state meet.

The events, entrants, and best 1962 time are the following: 100 yard dash, Mike Carrington (:10.1), Lyle Eroh (:10.3), and Bob Christiansen (:10.2). Carrington, Eroh, and Christiansen also ran the 220 yard dash with times of :22.8, :23.7, and :23.4, respectively. Carrington was the conference champ and district runner-up in both races. Senior Captain Terry Fairbanks, French Fraker, and Bob Evans were the hurdlers, running both the 120 yard highs and 180 yard lows. Fairbanks won the conference and district highs in :14.8 with Fraker second both times at :15.3. Fairbanks took second place in the same meets in the low hurdles in a time of :20.6. Fraker's best time for this event was

The Maroons were very strong in the middle distances, the 440 and 880 yard runs. Leading the quarter-milers was Jim Kearns, conference and district runner-up, (:50.9). His best time for the half mile was 2:04.0. Steve Hatfield ran 440 yards on the mile relay team in :51.3. James Terry, 1963 cross country captain-elect, ran in both the 880 and 440 with best times of :52.5 for the quarter and 2:05 even for the half mile. Another 440 man was a sophomore standout, John Ingleman (:53.1).

Hatfield was the outstanding half-miler, covering the distance in 2:01.1, fast enough to cop the district title. In the mile, his best time was 4:43.1. Conference runner-up and district mile champ Don Fuller set the new school mile record of 4:30.6. He also ran a few half miles, his best time being 2:01.9. Another miler-half miler was junior Bob Randolph, who turned in times of 4:41.0 and 2:04.6, respectively.



Probably the weakest area of the team was the field events; not, however, because of inability, but rather inexperience. The weight men were juniors Roger Capan and Dale Bumpus. Capan got off heaves of 50' 10" in the shot put and 150' 1" in the discus. Bumpus was right behind with a 48' shot put and 146' throw with the discus. Coach Jester found a bright spot in the pole vault as Mack Hemphill took sixth place in the state meet with a vault of 12 feet 3½ inches. Hemphill was also conference champ. Senior Rich Johnson was second vaulter, and turned in a 11-foot 6-inch performance.

The Maroon's high jumping chores were handled by Captain Terry Fairbanks and French Fraker. Fairbanks' best jump was 5' 10" and Fraker's was just an inch below at 5' 9". Sophomore Dave Riddell assisted Fairbanks in the broad jump, as Riddell leaped 20' 6", two inches short of Fairbanks' best of 20' 8".

The strongest area of the team was relays. The two mile relay team was made up of Bob Randolph, Jim Kearns, Don Fuller, and Steve Hatfield. Their best time, 8:21.0, established a new school record. Kearns and Hatfield, plus Jim Terry and sophomore John Ingleman made up the mile relay team that won the district and took third in the conference and had a best time of 3:30 flat. On the half-mile relay team were Lyle Eroh, Bob Christiansen, Gordon Quill and Mike Carrington.

Coach Jester qualified eight men in eight events for the state meet but could do no better than a sixth, recorded in the pole vault. Terry Fairbanks doubled in the 120 yard high hurdles and the 180 yard lows. Jim Kearns ran the 440 and a leg of the mile relay as did Steve Hatfield, who doubled in the 880. Jim Terry and John Ingleman completed the team. Don Fuller was entered in the mile and fared well considering the field. Mack Hemphill was in the pole vault and copped a sixth and our only weight man was junior Rog Capan. Hemphill was the only point producer as Champaign did not place.

Mike Carrington, sprinter, was elected captain of the 1963 squad, and should prove strong in many events. Next year's Maroons should find the field events to their liking as both varsity weight men will return. Sprints and middle distances will see many returnees too, to defend our Big 12 Championship trophy.



During the course of the season, the Maroons broke seventy-three records and established new varsity records at the YMCA pool in all events except the one hundred yard backstroke. Leading the assault was senior freestyler Bob Bachman, who broke at least one record per meet.

Swimming in the one hundred sixty yard medley relay were Vern Tock, Pete Bates, Dave Frericks, and Tom Trigger. Bob Bachman, Dave Dickey, Tom Trigger, and Dave Florio swam the two hundred yard freestyle relay and sprinters included Florio, Bachman, Tom Trigger, Butch Haussermann, Dave Dickey, John Younger, Dave Easterbrook,


and Jeff Trigger.





Led by three sophomores, Coach John Macek's golfers came through with a 14 win-5 loss season. Senior captain Rick Lynch, along with Ron Essenpreis, Jeff Hindman, and John Mulliken, were mainstays throughout the year, and senior Jack McKenna rounded out the top five for the season.

The linkmen started off 1962 by slamming Villa Grove here 12-1, then traveled to Danville, breezing past Schlarman with a near perfect score, 14½-½.

Champaign came home to their first conference meet with Urbana in which they downed the Tigers, 11-4. On their own course, the Mattoon golfers evened out the Maroon's conference record at one and one with a 9-6 victory.

The Maroons then participated in their first triangular meet, at Decatur, and came off with a 11½-6½ win over Decatur MacArthur and a 5½-12½ loss to conference foe Stephen Decatur.

After only two conference wins, the Maroons went across town to bounce the Tigers of Urbana once again, 10-5. Danville put CHS under the .500 mark in a close conference match at home, 6½-8½, making a record of 2 and 3.

The following triangular was also total strokes, and the Maroons, with 403, took first place handily. At the University of Illinois' course at Savoy, Champaign again trounced Uni High, 14 to 1, while at Lake-of-the Woods, Mahomet-Seymour fell to the powerful Maroon golfers 11 to 4.

Conference

In a triangular meet with Danville and Mattoon (previous Maroon victors), the links downed Mattoon 12-1 but fell again to the Vikings as before, $6\frac{1}{2}$ - $8\frac{1}{2}$. The Maroons then ended their dual meet season with a perfect score of 15-0 over Decatur Eisenhower.

The Maroon's link season was later complimented by a third place finish in the rugged Quincy Invitational, Big Twelve Conference Crown, District Championship, and a lofty third place finish in the State meet. This was the most successful Golf team since the 1951 State Champs.




Baseball 1962

Under Coach Charlie Due, the diamondmen rolled to an excellent thirteen and eight season. The Maroons repeated as conference and district champs and as last year fell in the semi-finals of the sectional tourney. Sophomore Larry Bundy and juniors Don Langhoff and Chuck Hutchcraft led the team in hitting with percentages of .344, .328, and .364 respectively. Senior Carl Punkay led the hurlers with a 7-3 record, followed by Bundy, 4-2, and senior Chuck Peabody, 3-3. The infield (pitcher and catcher not included) will be returning in 1963. Three year center fielder Bob Waller spearheaded the outfield with a .270 batting average as he came up with hits in the clutch.

The Maroons started off the 1962 season by beating Decatur Eisenhower 4-0, then repeating the score and victory versus Springfield Feitshans in the first game of a doubleheader, only to have the hosts hand Due's men their first loss 4-3 in the night-cap. Danville then evened our record in a close conference clash, 2-1. The Maroons got some revenge in bombing the Clinton Maroons, 11-1.

A very good Kankakee team came to McKinley Field and very rudely took both games of a double-header from CHS by scores of 18-7 and a closer 4-3. The Maroons, however, bounced back at Mattoon, winning twice against the Green Wave, 6-5, and 11-5. With a 12-10 victory over Lincoln, the diamondmen extended their win streak to three. In the first game of a twin bill, Larry Bundy, sophomore slugger, showed the way, as the Maroons took a lopsided 15-5 decision from Springfield. The Senators came back in the night cap, however, registering a narrow 5-4 victory.


Due's men then avenged an earlier loss to conference rival Danville by winning 4-2. For the third time this season, the Maroons were able to win the first game of a double-header, this time a 4-0 decision over Peoria Central, but could not nail down the second game, as Central came back to post a close 4-3 victory. Captain Ron Moyer and 1963 captain-elect John Younger led the way as the CHS tennis team, under the excellent coaching of Fred Atterbury, concluded the 1962 season with one of the best records in many years—seven wins, seven defeats, and one tie. This new improvement and a record turnout for the tennis matches indicate that the interest in tennis is being revived, making for a bright future in the sport. An extra glory was a district first as there was no conference meet.

Against Rantoul, Champaign gained their only tie, 4-4. At Mattoon, in a conference meet, the netters were soundly defeated, 7-1, but bounced back to notch their second victory, downing Danville Schlarman 6-1. Champaign then came back to their home courts, only to lose to Granite City, 7-2. Later revenged the earlier tie with the Rantoul Eagles, winning 6-4. In their first home conference meet, the Maroons were downed 3-2 by the Danville Vikings.

Champaign then traveled to Lincoln, under the direction of Lee Cabutti, won the meet 5-1. A split in the doubles gave the Maroons a narrow 4-3 victory over Bloomington, while Danville handed Champaign their fourth defeat, 4-2. In a rematch with Mattoon the netters could manage only two points to the Green Wave's five.

In the district tourney at Danville, which the Maroons won, Ron Moyer and John Younger won first place in the doubles competition, while Steve Howard was downed in the singles' semi-finals.

Decatur MacArthur, playing on their home court, pasted the Maroons 9-0, but the netmen boosted their morale by defeating Danville Schlarman, also 9-0. In the following conference meet, Stephen Decatur slammed Champaign 7-0. The Maroons followed with a win, sliding past Springfield, 4-3. A 6-2 win over Eisenhower completed the 7-7-1 record.

Although senior stalwarts Ron Moyer, Steve Howard, and Jerry Wiley will graduate at the close of this year, the 1962 team has much to anticipate in Captain John Younger, Al Williamson, John Pierce, Ron Iverson, Gary Smith, Denny Kunza and Lance Allee.
