



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


Twin-city Champs

Tigers Bat a Thousand










Mat Athletes Show Pride








Super Season!

The girls' junior varsity team did all right with big victories over cross-cown rivals Central (16-9) and Centennial (17-15).




Disappointment on the Track

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


Dean Hixon loses his finese in the final yard
