
Interact Makes Charger Marquee a Reality








Student Council's Presence Is Clearly Seen




Excitement of Show Develops Talents, Skill



Service Occupations, Industrial Cooperative Education, the Distributive Education Clubs of America, and CVE II were all sections of Cooperative Vocational Education. In each of these courses, the student attends regular classes in the morning and goes to work at his training station in the afternoon. One class period is spent at school studying about his present occupation or others in which he is interested. Service Occupations includes jobs in food service, health occupations, child care, and clothing construction and repair. A student enrolled in Industrial Cooperative Education might work as a mechanic, a printer or in a recreational field. Distributive Education Clubs of America includes the student in retailing. It is the DECA students who decorate Centennial's southwest showcase. CVE II is a course designed for the student who has successfully completed the first year of CVE in any of the vocational education courses or has had considerable work experience.






