The Special Call meeting of the Champaign County Section of the N.C.N.W. opened with the reading of our Pledge - Ruthie Hillsman, President, presiding.

Secretary's report was read - with no additions or corrections, the minutes were approved as read.

Miriam Scantlebury, Treasurer, distributed copies of the Treasurer's Report to all present. Balance on hand in our checking account as of May 16, was \$732.44. The report was approved as submitted.

Hattie Marion reported the luncheon was a great success, and she extended great appreciation for everyone's support.

President Hillsman updated us on the trip to the Black Expo in Indianapolis. The correct date is July 19th. The bus service reserved had to be cancelled due to the change of date - so contacts are being made with other bus companies to provide transportation. At the moment, the Expo trip is on hold.

The annual "Taste of N.C.N.W." which is to be on June 14th is questionable due to previous events at the church, so other arrangements are to be made. Octavia Cole checked with the Church Clerk, but the June Calendar was not made, so to resolve the matter, the date was changed to June 21st.

Haruko Kinase-Leggett, Chair of the Harvest of Cultures, gave copies of her report to those present. Due to impending restrictions by the Champaign-Urbana Public Health District, it was decided to cancel the event for 1997. A motion was made by Octavia Cole, modified by President Hillsman, that the event be cancelled. With a "show of hands", the Festival of Cultures will not be held this year. To replace this fund raiser, Tanya Jackson volunteered to spearhead a type of "Silent-Auction" event to raise funds for the organization. Another event might be a "Thanksgiving Festival" at the new Holiday Inn was also suggested.

Haruko reported that the pre-paid reservation deposit is refundable and requested President Hillsman to take care of it. It is possible that it should remain intact for the next fund-raising event.

Harvest of Cultures Donation Presented

A donation of \$350 raised from Champaign-Urbana's Harvest of Cultures was presented to Covenant for the Sister Mary Gabriel

Curby Fund in late January.

The Harvest of Cultures, a joint project between the University YWCA and the Champaign County National Council of Negro Women (NCNW), raised money for both the Martin Luther King Jr. Scholarship Fund and the Curby Fund. This is the first year funds have been donated to the Curby Fund and, according to NCNW Spokeswoman Doris Hoskins, it is a very good cause.

"I have been around Covenant and have seen the good the Curby Fund does, especially for those who can't afford their own medicine," Hoskins said. "It really is a good cause."

The fellowship has extended to the Curby Fund, which is used for immediate needs of the poor served by Covenant and is named after Sister Mary Gabriel Curby, administrator of the former Mercy Hospital. The fund goes toward people's needs such as bus fare, cab fare, cafeteria meals, or overnight lodging.

"The fellowship of all different cultures is what allows us to make this donation," said Harvest of Cultures chairwoman Haruko Kinase-Leggett. "We're very happy we could help."

GRANNY KATHRYN by Anna Owens

Kathryn is a sister, wife, mother, grandmother, great-grandmother and godmother, in addition to being a friend to many. She is loved for her graciousness, her wisdom, wit and unselfishness. She was born and raised in Champaign. When she retired she was the first and only African American female to hold a position in the Veterinary Medicine department at the University of Illinois.

I met Kathryn, whom I lovingly refer to as "Granny," through a church missionary group over which she presided. I soon learned that she was both biblically wise, and life-wise. I am too old to be her biological grandchild but she is my spiritual granny nevertheless. We all know how grandmothers treat children, a firm hand when needed, an open mind, a listening ear and a loving heart. She will always tell you what is right even when it is not what you want to hear, she always comforts you when you are hurting, and lifts you when you are down, and she can always go into her kitchen and make you a wonderful meal.

Her file cabinet is under the sofa pillow. If you need a quote or theme, or some church history, look under the pillow. Don't understand a point of scripture, call Kathryn. Not sure of the best way to handle a situation or problem, call Kathryn. Upset or angry, call Granny Kathryn. She uses great energy in encouraging those younger than her to grow in Christ, to learn, branch out and to be exposed to godly retreats, conferences and activities regardless of church denomination.

With a lovely smile, Kathyrn says that younger women keep her youthful in thought and mind. She offers young people a safe place where they can discuss any issue. Mothers are quick to send their young daughters to stay with Kathryn while they go to school or start new jobs. They know their daughters will be safe and secure with Granny Kathyrn. With love, I refer to her home as "Kathryn's Hotel."

Kathryn is very community-oriented and has held and continues to hold positions on many Boards of Directors, in addition to being a committee member for several community businesses. Kathryn believes in her Christian commitment to visit persons who are ill and confined. She runs errands for those unable to do so and provides transportation when needed.

In all the years that I have known her she has never said that she is tired, or unwell. She talks of her experience of marching from Selma to Montgomery with Martin Luther King in 1965, but never boasts about her own achievements. She lives her life very quietly, going about her works without seeking praise, glory or approval from the world. Her favorite saying is, "I know who I am and I know whose I am."

Anna Owens is a mother of two, a grandmother, an AIDS activist, and an ambassador of goodwill.
